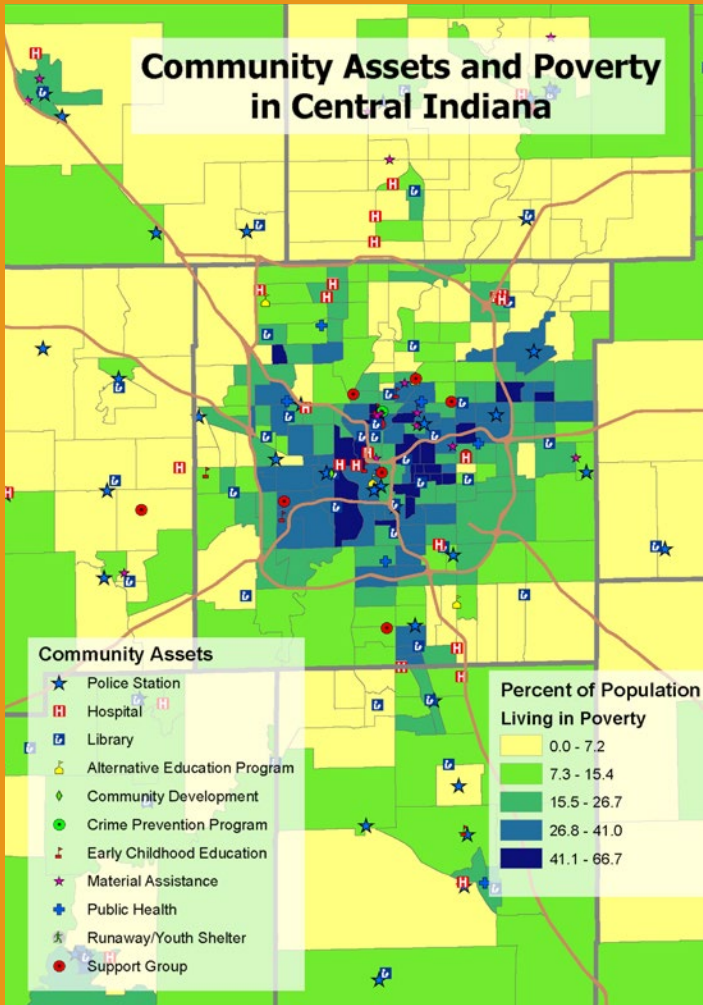

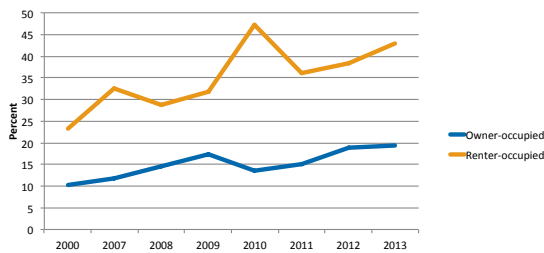


Community Assets and Poverty in Central Indiana

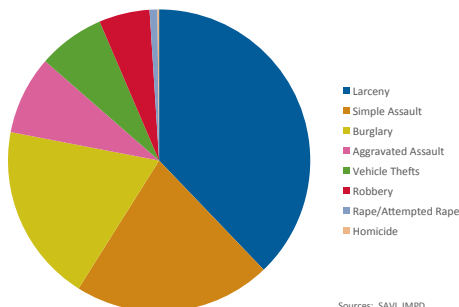
Percent of Households with High Housing Costs in Johnson County (Greater than 35% of Income)

SAVI PLANNING POWERS NORTHSIDE MISSION MINISTRY'S IMPACT

INDIANAPOLIS – [Second Presbyterian Church](#) in Indianapolis wanted to be sure.

The church community had long felt that its [Northside Mission Ministry](#) was positively impacting Washington Township, but could anything more be done, any additional resources leveraged?

With help from SAVI, NMM identified needs down to the street level to reveal gaps and identify the crucial unmet needs in their community: housing, utilities assistance, food and clothing assistance.

Here are some of the ways we're serving as the primary resource of Central Indiana community information for organizations just like yours.

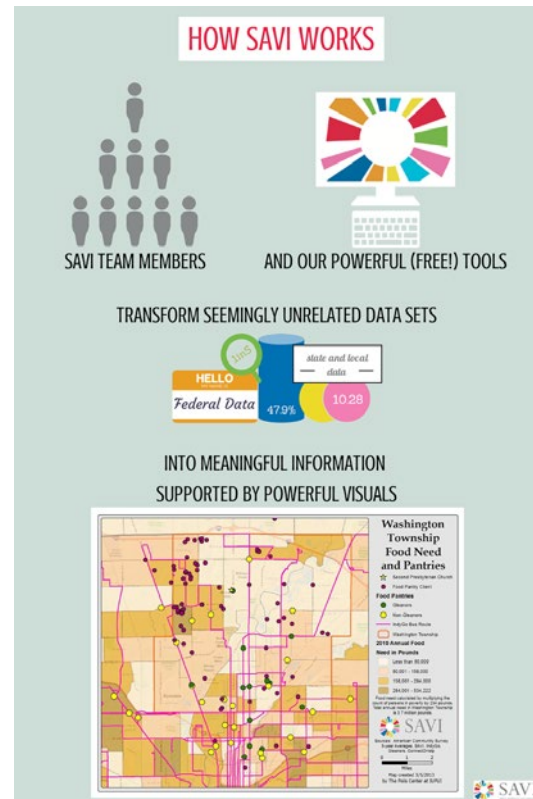

ASK SAVI

WHAT KIND OF DATA SETS DOES SAVI OFFER RELATED TO BASIC NEEDS?

SAVI provides more than 10,000 indicators in categories like demographics; home ownership; poverty status; and public safety, and you are able to break out these indicators by census tracts, city limits, counties, ZIP codes, and nearly a dozen other geographic units. SAVI also provides the locations of existing community resources such as emergency food providers, utility assistance programs, and shelters.

HOW CAN SAVI HELP ME UNCOVER TRENDS IN MY SERVICE AREA?

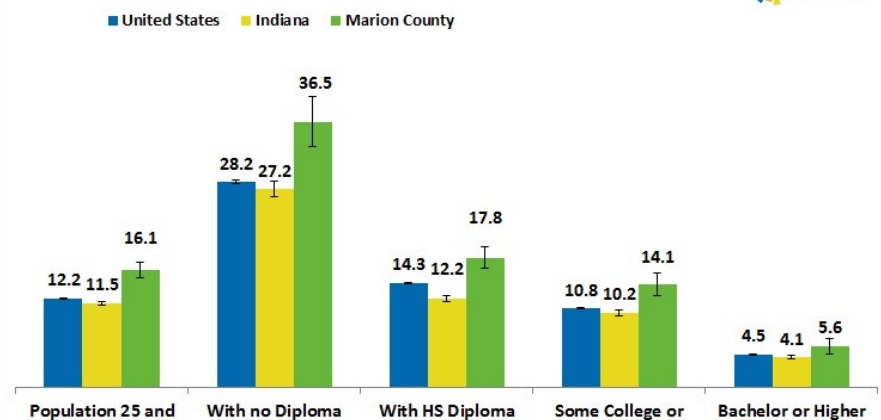
Some of our data categories are available starting in the year 1988 through the present, and

the overwhelming majority track back to at least 2005 and on through the 1990s. So, when we talk about helping you understand what’s trending in your community, we back it up by providing unparalleled depth and context.

HOW ARE OTHER BASIC NEEDS PROVIDERS USING SAVI TODAY?

The tool is helping these organizations either identify or confirm pockets of extreme poverty in their service areas. Others are seeking out food deserts in order to bring appropriate resources into these locations. Our crime data sets are helping organizations that respond to domestic violence deploy resources most effectively.

EXPOSING THE SCOPE OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE



INDIANAPOLIS – The [Domestic Violence Network \(DVN\)](#) website features “Heather’s Story” among other videos in the *Power of Images* series that shares the faces of domestic violence in Central Indiana.

Heather died in 2007, the victim of brutal attack by her high school boyfriend.

[Stories like Heather’s](#) help communicate the real and devastating impacts of domestic violence, but DVN also wanted to communicate the scope of need for services in Marion County, where it works with community members to advocate, educate and collaborate for an end to domestic violence.

For us, it is crucial to be able to understand the state of domestic violence in our service area before we rally resources and supporters to the cause,” says Chris Warren, DVN Director of Community Engagement. “Before we partnered with SAVI, it was very difficult for us to generate reliable statistics, especially for the criminal justice system in Marion County.

To illustrate the far-reaching effects of domestic violence in Marion County and understand some of its root causes, DVN engaged the experts at SAVI to analyze data from the criminal justice system.

“Working with SAVI has been great, because they’ve been very efficient in taking our vision and making it a reality,” says Kelly McBride, the DVN Executive Director. “Attempting to link and analyze the data we needed before SAVI was tedious, but it was all so easy once we partnered with SAVI.”

The DVN and SAVI partnership produced the [Domestic Violence in the Criminal Justice System Marion County, Indiana report](#) in April 2014.

“Our SAVI team used special techniques to link criminal justice records together in ways never done before to get the most accurate profiles of victims and perpetrators who’ve moved through the legal system,” says Sharon Kandris, SAVI project director.

“SAVI generated reports that answered many of the questions we had,” McBride says. “By having a better understanding of domestic violence in the criminal justice system, we are able to better allocate resources.”

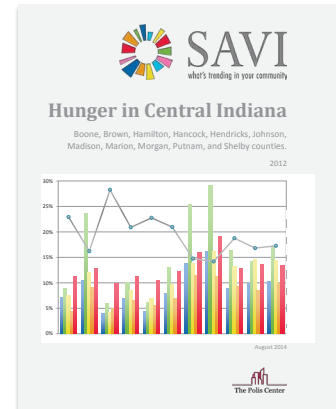
More effective DVN services means intentional work to educate and collaborate with the community, which will ultimately save lives and prevent more stories like Heather’s from becoming a terrible reality for families and friends.

HUNGER REPORT SHOWS NEED IN UNEXPECTED PLACE

Our Northside Mission Ministry case study video on page three is just one example of how hunger continues to impact our communities. Awareness is half the battle of mitigating hunger. *Hunger in Central Indiana* shows who is affected by food insecurity—it's not what you would expect.

The report also includes an interview with a local food pantry director that went undercover as a food pantry client before opening his church pantry, a story that reveals the kinds of changes that need to occur in our food delivery system.

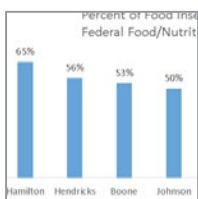

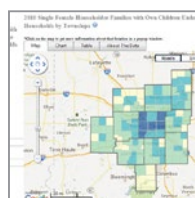
